# **IIIM Syria** Report results

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#### **Foreword**

I am pleased to share with you this report on the results of the Mechanism's work in 2023. With this new tool, the Mechanism demonstrates its commitment to results-based management and showcases the pivotal role and impact of our work. The report builds upon our <u>Strategic Plan 2023-25</u> and shows the progress we have achieved in relation to the objectives and targets therein.

In 2023, our support to the jurisdictions investigating atrocity crimes in Syria contributed to major wins for justice and accountability. These include cases which led to the successful conviction and life sentencing of perpetrators for war crimes and murder in Germany and the conviction of a perpetrator of war crimes in Sweden. These are just two examples of the many tangible outcomes of our work. And yet it takes months, often years of investigation to get to that point.

The most compelling evidence of our impact is the significant increase in requests for assistance from jurisdictions received last year. In 2023, we received a total of 87 requests, compared to only 13 in 2018, our initial year of operation. In just the first four months of 2024, we have already received 45 new requests, a pattern which shows no sign of abating.

This continuous rise in demand for our support is welcome, as it demonstrates an interest and reliance by jurisdictions on our products and expertise. More importantly, it sends a strong message to all, in Syria and beyond, that atrocity crimes are successfully prosecuted, and perpetrators sentenced. This message is all the more important and necessary in the global context where we see such crimes on the rise.

Yet, despite this positive news for the fight against impunity, the picture for the Mechanism is less so: for the first time since our establishment, we are compelled to plan sizable cuts in our activities due to insufficient funding. The financial resources made available to us are not keeping pace with the significant increase in demands for our services. Without renewed commitments from our donors, we will have no choice but to turn down requests for our assistance.

I hope that this report will strengthen your conviction that the Mechanism has now become an established and instrumental actor in the struggle for accountability in Syria, a role which my successor Robert Petit will continue to develop further.

## Publicly disclosed contributions to justice processes







### **Outcome 1**

## EFFECTIVELY SUPPORT COMPETENT JURISDICTIONS INVESTIGATING OR PROSECUTING ATROCITY CRIMES IN SYRIA

IIIM provides competent jurisdictions<sup>1</sup> with timely information, analysis, services and evidence that is useful to their investigations, prosecutions, and other judicial proceedings both proactively and through expeditiously responding to requests for assistance.

- Performance measure: number of distinct investigations enhanced with information provided by the Mechanism (cumulative)
- Performance measure: number of information and evidence packages proactively made available to competent jurisdictions





- <sup>1</sup> The jurisdictions that the IIIM can share information with include courts and tribunals, including law enforcement agencies, investigative authorities, prosecutorial authorities, and judges that:
  - Have jurisdiction to investigate, prosecute and try the crimes covered by the IIIM's mandate.
  - Respect international human rights laws and standards.
  - Would not apply the death penalty for the offences being considered.

IIIM can also assist with non-criminal law judicial proceedings that concern liability for crimes in Syria falling under the IIIM's mandate in jurisdictions, in line with the IIIM's terms of reference.








IIIM collects, preserves and consolidates high value information and evidence, and produces comprehensive, advanced analysis that could assist a future jurisdiction seized of the entire Syrian situation.







## IMPROVE THE IMPACT AND INTEGRATION OF COMMUNICATION WITH VICTIMS, SURVIVORS AND SYRIAN CIVIL SOCIETY

IIIM preserves information important to victims/survivors, engages in two-way communication and collaboration, promotes justice outcomes, and advocates for comprehensive accountability.

## Monitoring, risk management and evaluation

#### **MONITORING**

The strategic plan framework includes quarterly strategic review meetings where progress on the objectives is discussed. This forum has been used in 2023 to better align resources with priorities. Also, in 2023 the IIIM implemented a software monitoring tool to facilitate data collection analysis and reporting.

#### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

In 2023, the IIIM completed its first Enterprise Risk Management process as guided by the UN Secretariat's Policy Framework. The process identified six medium risks and two high risks recorded in the IIIM risk register. The Local Risk Management Working Group meets on a quarterly basis to advance the risk treatment plan.

#### **EVALUATION**

The IIIM commissioned the first independent evaluation of its work from establishment in 2016 through 2022. The evaluation identified 10 recommendations, which received a management response and a corresponding implementation plan. The evaluation highlighted the impact achieved by the IIIM in its first seven years, describing it as "highly relevant and coherent" with a "well established client orientation".




## IMPLEMENTATION RATE (FULL OR PARTIAL) OF GENDER STRATEGY ACTION PLANS


## **Funding overview**


The IIIM is primarily funded through assessed contributions from Member States to the UN regular budget (RB). This funding is complemented by voluntary contributions (extrabudgetary funding, or XB) from donors, the majority of which are Member States.

In 2023, the first implementation year of the 2023-2025 Strategic Plan, the IIIM's total expenditure was USD 22,068,000. Of this total, 71 per cent was funded by the United Nations regular budget and 29 per cent by voluntary contributions.

The UN regular budget should finance all activities mandated by the General Assembly. The regular budget allocation, however, has maintained constant since 2020 and therefore does not keep pace with the growth in the demand for IIIM's services.


For the second year in a row, in 2023, the IIIM faced a level of demand for its services which exceeded its annual income and could only be met by drawing on extra budgetary reserves accumulated from past years. These reserves are now depleted.





#### **INCREASING DEMANDS FROM COMPETENT JURISDICTIONS**

In 2023, the Mechanism's total income was outpaced by the increasing requests for its services, notably in requests for assistance from competent jurisdictions. As a result, in 2024 we have had to take measures such a reduction in workforce, and related areas of mandated work. Our clients, from victims and survivors to competent jurisdictions, increasingly count on the Mechanism. And we count on our donors to help us maintain these opportunities to pursue accountability for the crimes that continue to be committed in Syria.
